- Political Party
 - A political party is made up of politicians, individuals or teams of activists and voters whose goal is to win control of government.

Political Party Structure

A political party is an empty vessel, which has meaning only through the principles and actions of those who choose to use it for their own purposes.

Without working through a political party, conservatives will never implement our principles in the policy-making process.

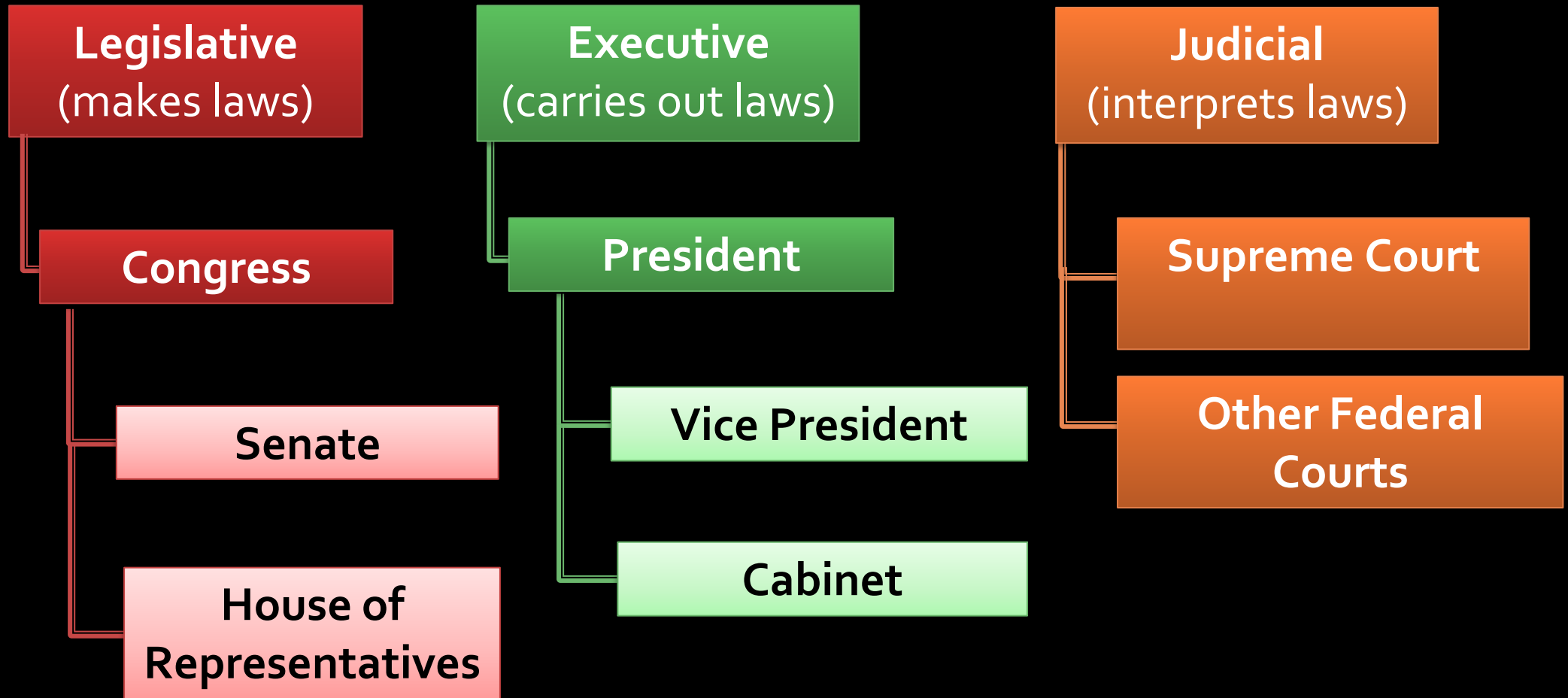

- U.S. Constitution Article 4 Section 4
 - The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government
- Republican Form of Government
 - “A form of government in which a state is ruled by representatives of the citizen body”
- Citizen body= Voter

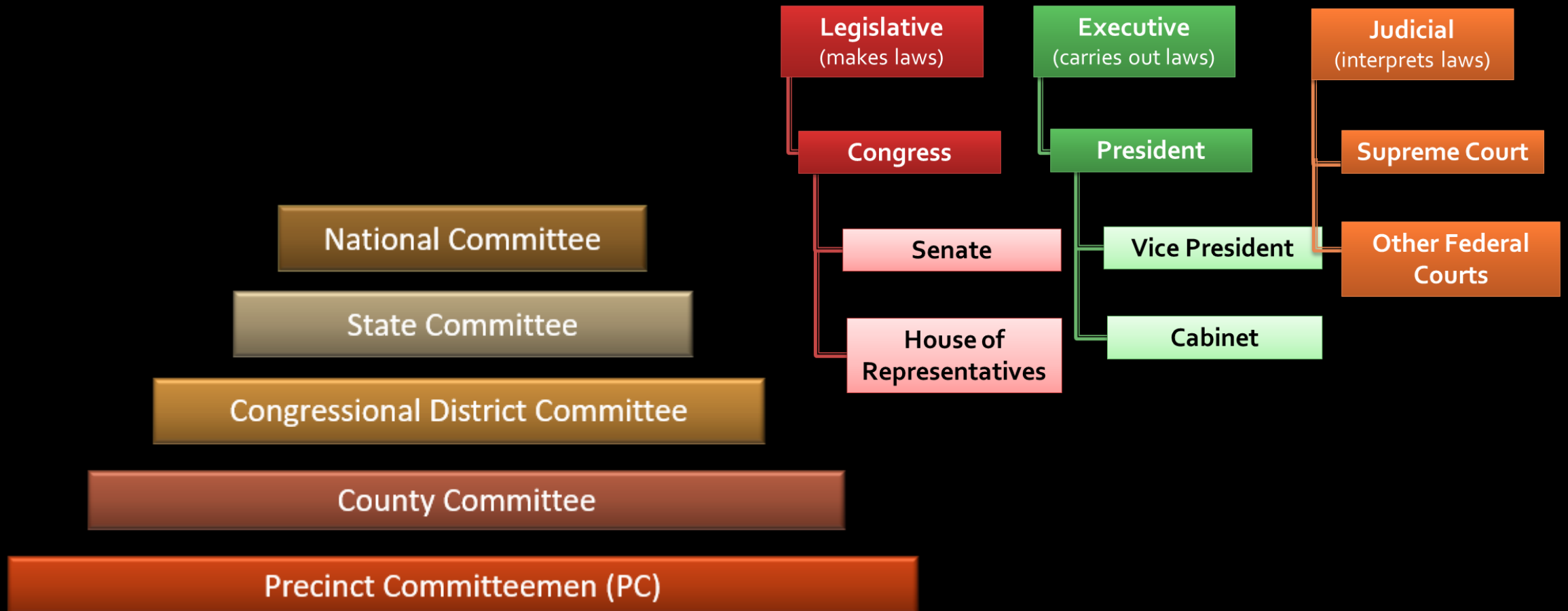

What is a Political Party

- ◆ A group of people organized to acquire and exercise political power
- ◆ Individuals who organize to win elections, operate government, and influence public policy
- ◆ A political party brings together people with the same political ideas.

What is a Political Party

- ◆ Parties can be
 - principle-oriented
 - issue-oriented
 - election-oriented.

2 Party System

◆ Advantage

- More Stable
- Run more smoothly
 - Know how deal with each other
 - Not lose voters=minor changes only vs. big changes

2 Party System

◊ Disadvantage

- Fewer Candidate choices
- Supporting the party they disagree with the *least* vs. feeling strongly about
- Stop participating due to lack of options or thinking vote doesn't matter

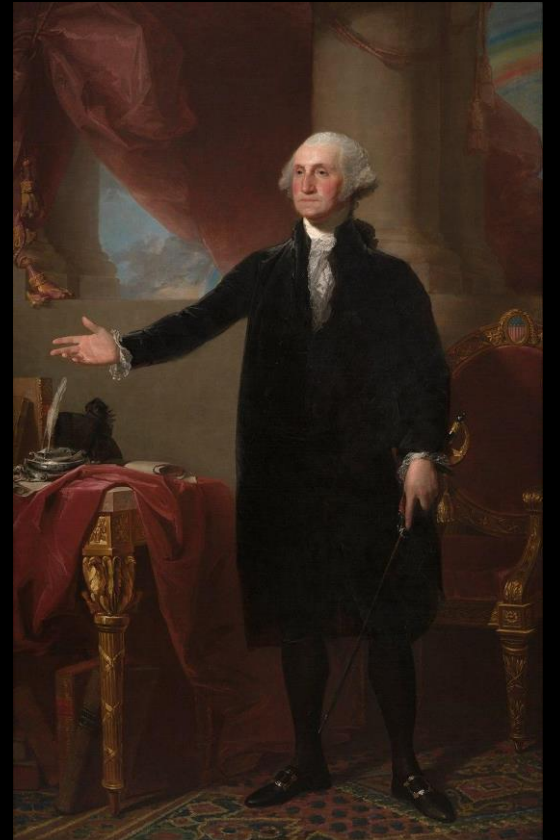
- ◆ Political factions or parties began to form during the struggle over ratification of the federal Constitution of 1787.



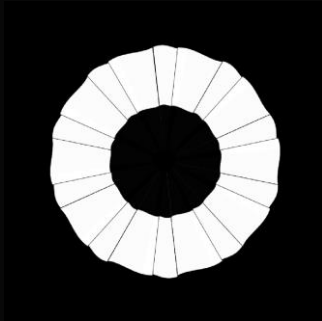

The Precinct

- ◆ Your neighborhood
- ◆ The smallest political unit in the country
 - 5,068 precincts in Indiana
 - Population between 1000-2000 residents
 - Range from 10 Precincts in Union County to nearly 600 in Marion County
 - Voters 600-800 in city precincts and 250-400 in rural precincts

Precinct Committeemen (PC)

Precinct Committeeman Qualifications

- ◆ Be Registered to Vote
- ◆ Live in the precinct running for the elected position
- ◆ Must be a member in good-standing with the Republican Party (IRSC Rule 1-25)

Precinct Committeeman Qualifications

- ◆ Voted in the Primary as a Republican
 - Voted in 2 most recent primary elections in Indiana in which you voted in. (IC3-8-2-7-4a and IRSC Rule 1-24)
- ◆ CAN-37 Form
- ◆ Form submitted at the County Clerk's Office

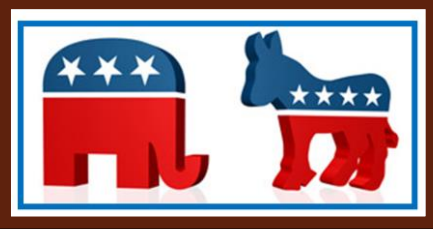

Precinct Committeeman Duties

- ◆ 4 Year term
- ◆ 3 Main Duties
- ◆ 1st Duty: Appoint your Vice-Precinct Committeeman within 30 days of election (Rule 3-9)

Precinct Committeeman Duties

◆ 2nd Duty: Elect the County Committee Officers

- 1st Saturday in March in the year following each presidential election
- Chairman
- Vice-Chairman
- Secretary
- Treasurer

Precinct Committeeman Duties

- ◆ Participate in Caucuses
- ◆ 3rd Duty: Filling vacancies

IC 3-13-11-5 and IC 3-13-11-9

When filling a vacancy for public office or ballot vacancy by caucus, only precinct committeemen who meet the statute requirements are eligible to vote.

Precinct Committeeman Duties

- ◆ Caucus- a private meeting run by political parties
- ◆ U.S. House Vacancies- Special election after a Caucus
- ◆ State and County Caucuses- takes office immediately

Precinct Committeeman Duties

Extra duties that are nice to have/do

- ◆ Make a list of people who will vote with you (Building Lists)
- ◆ Talk to these voters (Knocking Doors)
- ◆ Turn out ALL favorable voters to the polls on Election Day (Turn Out the Vote)

Precinct Committeeman Duties

- ◆ Fill your Precinct Election Boards (Election Workers)
 - Vote Centers vs. Precinct voting sites
 - ◆ Vote Centers=“super precincts” for the whole county
 - ◆ Precinct Voting=required to vote within precinct residing in

Vice-Precinct Committeeman

- ◆ Appointed by the **ELECTED** precinct committeeman- serve at the pleasure of the elected precinct committeeman
- ◆ Must be a qualified voter in the county in which they are appointed
- ◆ Duties
 - Elect the County Committee Officers
 - Proxy for Precinct Committeeman in a Caucus

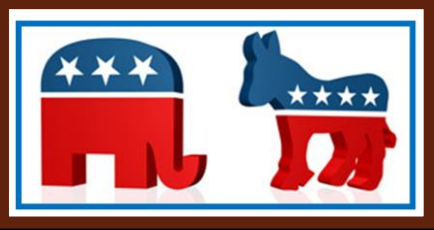

- ◆ • IRSC Rule 2-1
 - ◆ Official PC list is kept on file with the State Party Secretary.
 - ◆ County Secretary -complete PC list for their individual counties

◆ Duties:

2. Appointing election officials for precincts for election day

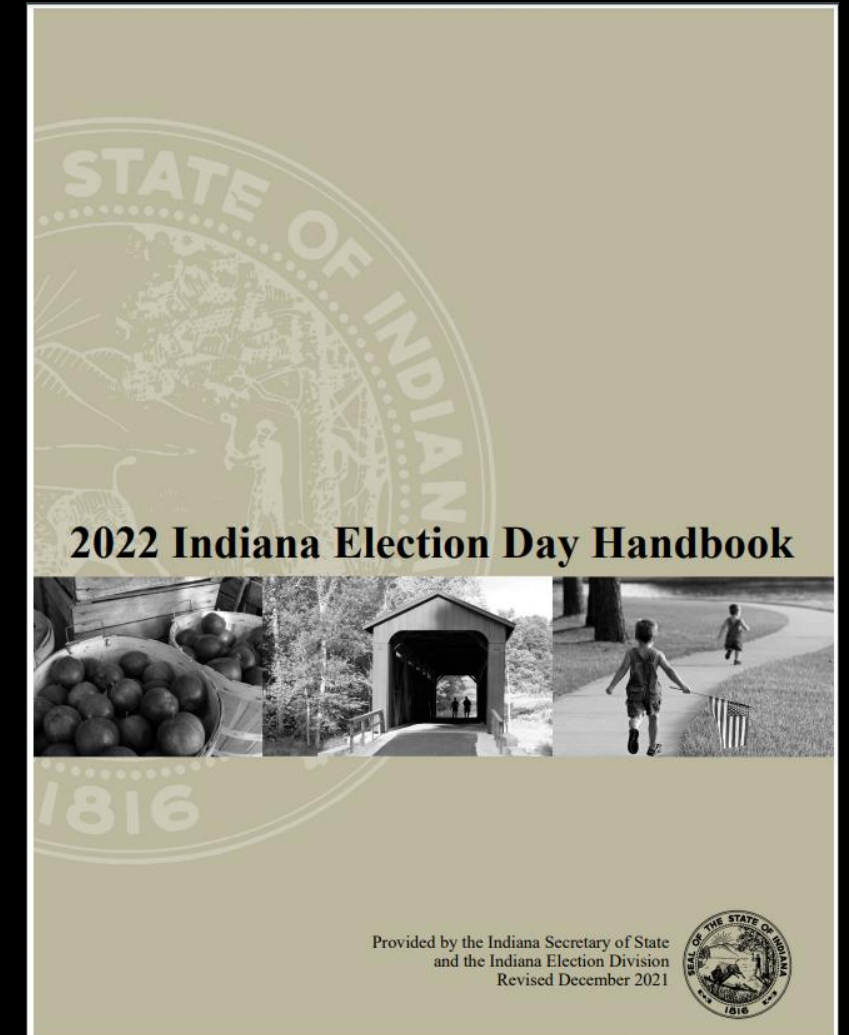

- ◆ Required to have one meeting annually (IRSC Rule 4-20)

 - 50%+1= 10 votes

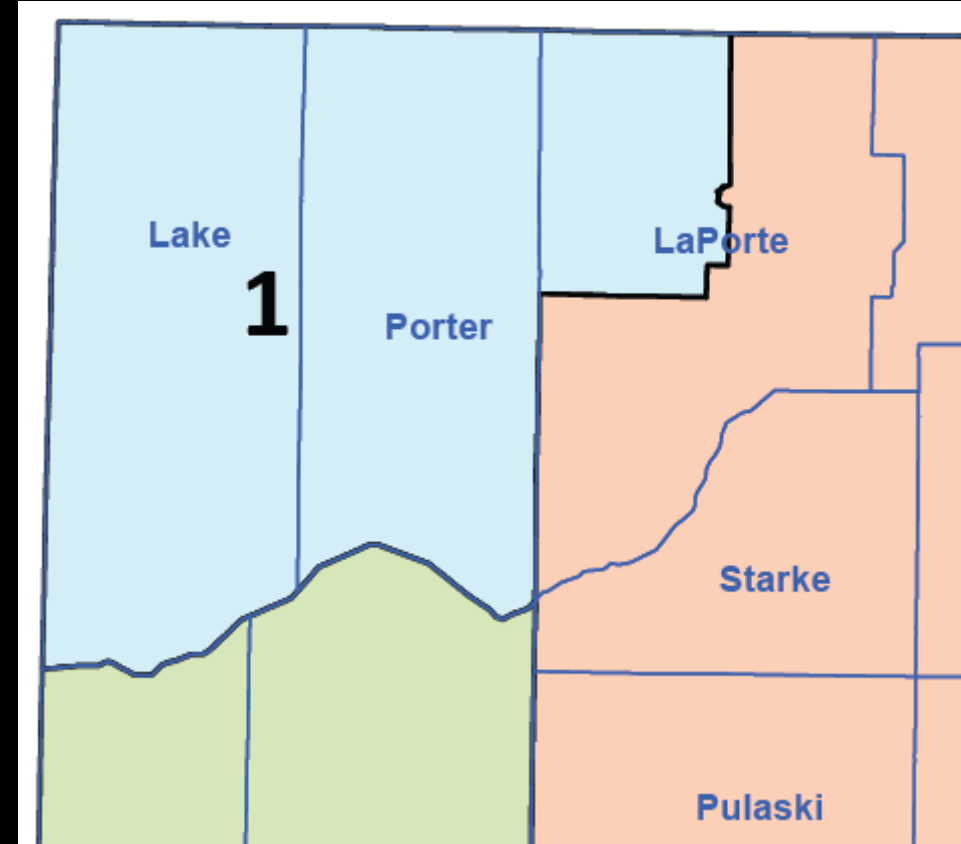
